ROAD SAFETY

We have noticed a significant increase in unsafe practices especially at the end of the school day. We know you are concerned about the safety of your child or children. We are concerned about the safety of all children. Please do not:

- park on yellow lines to load or unload
- load or unload while waiting at the pedestrian crossing
- drive into the staff carpark
- drive on the footpath on Inverell Ave or Great South Road
- park on the medium barrier
- park in the driveway in front of the gate
- call out to your children to run across the road

From now on we will be taking photos of any illegal behaviours and uploading them on the police website.

SCHOOL ACCESS

Oral language (talking) is an important part of the school curriculum. Understanding and using language is the foundation for all other learning.


Families are the key

Talking builds a bond between parent and child

How and what babies and children learn and how their brains develop depends on their relationships with caring, responsive adults and early positive experiences. For optimal development, children need repeated child-focused and meaningful interactions with a responsive parent or carer. Children who start school with good oral communication skills are ready to learn and likely to do well. Whatever their age or stage, talking to your child helps them to learn. Talking, playing, singing and reading to children does not have to be in English - use whatever language you are comfortable with.
