
STAFF CHANGES

The Samoan Disaster

I strongly agree that Prime Minister Helen Clark's formal apology was very much needed. The actions of Colonel Robert Logan has affected Samoa gravely. His decisions during the 1918 influenza pandemic has been regarded as, "one of the most disastrous epidemics recorded world-wide in the twentieth century."

The most compelling reason why I agree is the Prime Minister has mentioned that, "it is important for us to acknowledge tragic events which caused great pain and sorrow to Samoa." In addition she also stated that, "we regret the decision taken by the New Zealand authorities in 1918 to allow the ship, Talune, carrying passengers with influenza, to dock in Apia."

Unfortunately- 22% of the Samoan population died and the reason why was preventable. If Colonel Robert Logan hadn't authorised to let the passengers out, one of the worst recorded epidemics of the world wouldn't have happened.
